February Parish Council Meeting

- A street lantern on Birling Road on a traffic calming island was damaged by vandalism, causing water leakage which is causing the light to stop working occasionally. The Parish Council will replace the lantern.
- The Parish Council continues to liaise with Kent Highways to progress the Highways Improvement Plan wherever possible. We will update you when there is action to report.

Kent County Council

County Councillor Hohler provided the following report:

- KCC continues to work hard to present a balanced budget for the next financial year which remains a challenge.
- The bus industry in Kent (as in most parts of the UK) remains privatised. Since the start of 2022 Government and other support has enabled KCC to protect around 50 school services that were at risk of withdrawal. These services continue to be funded using Government funding. The cost of these services is estimated at around £3m a year when accounting for the contribution made towards them from passenger revenue.
- These commitments have exhausted the funding available through Government, and KCC's
 own budgets for supporting bus services are also fully allocated. Unfortunately, we are
 starting to see bus service cancellations get presented to us again with no funding
 available. KCC are not in a position to protect them and if other possible operators do not
 view them as commercially sustainable then they will stop. These cancellations will include
 school buses.
- There has, during 2022, been a recovery of Kent's tourism and the hospitality sector which has meant more jobs and good news for Kent.
- The University of Kent, with a group of staff and student volunteers, have, during the autumn, collected 5,500 Kg of surplus fruit and vegetables from local farms and distributed them via FARESHARE UK to charities, food banks and community initiatives
- The Business Investment Team has been processing over 100 pre applications from small and medium sized businesses in Kent and Medway for grants from £26,000 to £600,000 to grow and innovate.
- Hundreds of patients across Kent are now receiving care at home when they would normally have had to stay in hospitals thanks to Home First, the long awaited integration of health and social care, now in action.
- Childrens, services in Kent have recently been awarded an outstanding rating.
- The Port of Dover and the surrounding area could be hit by major disruption later this year when the EU Entry-Exit system launches. KCC has made the Government aware of their concerns and how it is likely to cause long traffic queues.
- Dog owners in Kent are being urged to keep control of their pets in the countryside, following a rise in attacks on sheep.

• Our trading standards officers have been working very hard to stop the huge imports of illegal vapes. KCC had asked the Government to ban them, which they have now done. However, they remain a problem as teenagers are attracted by their bright designs and different sweet and fruity, flavours.



TMBC

Borough Councillor Banks attended the Parish Council meeting.

- He has liaised with the Planning Officer about the Ryarsh Place Farm application. If she is minded to reject it she will produce a report, which would go to the Inspector if the applicant appeals the decision.
- He is working with Clarion about a property in Woodgate Road. They have given a third deadline of 19th February to deal with the fly tipping issue.
- TMBC are doing better financially than other Councils in Kent. Officers are being prudent looking at car parking charges to raise revenue, but he does not believe it is needed at the moment and will object to this.
- He is aware of the problems people have in seeing a doctor. When we talk about planning, this issue must be raised – what are the facilities to serve the housing that should be included, such as schools, doctors etc. These are needed to support the housing. The Integrated Care Board (ICB) should be consulted and say they support the proposals.



Kent Highways - Potholes

County Councillor Hohler has been in contact with Kent Highways, who have confirmed that pothole enquiries have been steadily rising over the past couple months. They are still aiming to repair within 28 days, however most locations where road widths do not allow adequate safety zones for the contractor Amey to deliver, they are looking at road closures. They estimate 60% of pothole jobs require more in-depth liaison and planning works before a gang has even attended to repair which will have an impact in keeping with the 28 day guarantee. This explains the overrun when a job is due for repair. Amey are completing more jobs than before.

Fly-tippers and litter bugs to face heftier fines



Dropping rubbish on the streets could cost you £500

Councillors have recommended an increase in the penalties for littering and fly-tipping in Tonbridge and Malling. Changes to government legislation allow councils to increase the maximum fixed penalty for littering from £150 to £500. The maximum for fly-tipping has risen from £400 to £1,000.

Members of the Communities and Environment Scrutiny Select Committee meeting on 7 February considered a range of increases that could now be adopted to deter people from dropping or dumping rubbish. A report set out four options, ranging from keeping penalties at current levels to adopting the new maximum for both types of offence.

The committee voted to support a two-tier approach to littering fines and moving to the maximum of £1,000 for fly-tipping. First time or small scale littering offences would attract a penalty of £250, or £125 if paid early, rising to the maximum of £500 for larger items or repeat offences.

The increase follows a pilot scheme with enforcement specialists, NES, which deploys officers in towns and villages across the borough to issue penalties for littering and investigate fly tips. The pilot is one of a range of measures contributing to the council's work to care for the environment, one of four **strategic priorities** set out in its corporate plan.

The trial scheme saw more than 3,400 fines issued during its first twelve months. Figures for 2022-2023, show Tonbridge and Malling recorded 833 incidents of fly-tipping and issued 83 fixed penalty notices for that offence, more than any other authority in Kent. <u>In June 2023</u>, councillors agreed to extend the trial so a permanent contractor could be appointed.

Cllr Martin Coffin, cabinet lead for transformation and infrastructure, said: 'When we prepared the report and looked at the options we had, we wanted to send a strong message. Everyone agrees that fly-tipping is absolutely abhorrent, so we will be making it widely known that that the fine for anyone caught doing it in Tonbridge and Malling will now be £1,000.'

Referring to comments from committee members about the need for enforcement officers to exercise discretion when dealing with littering, he added: 'We can also ensure that the operatives are trained so that they can understand the difference between an accidental and deliberate littering.'

The changes are due to be implemented when a new fly-tipping and litter enforcement contract starts later this year.

	Some short sections of quiet lane walking. Moderate difficulty.			
Wednesday 6 March	A circular meander through Mereworth Woods to Gover Hill returning via Herne Pound. Moderate difficulty.			
Thursday 14 March	Tudeley and Capel 'special churches' walk via Capel Church with its 13th century wall paintings and All Saints Tudeley, the only church in the world to have all its stained-glass windows designed by the celebrated 20th century artist, Marc Chagall. Moderate difficulty with 10 stiles.	6.5 miles		
Sunday 17 March	Horsmonden to Broad Ford and Brandfield through orchards, fields and farm tracks. Great views of the High Weald, Greensand Ridge and the Teise and Medway river valleys. Some quiet lanes; some stiles and hills; moderate difficulty.			
Thursday 21 March	Heaverham Hike: circular walk with a steep ascent at the start to the North Downs Way with far-reaching views. Four stiles; moderate difficulty.	5 miles
