

RYARSH PARISH COUNCIL

April Parish Council Meeting

- The Notice Board on Birling Road by the Play Area is in a poor state of repair and Councillors have agreed to replace it. One side will be locked for Parish Council notices and the other will be unlocked for residents to use.
- The Parish Council has agreed to purchase a new bench to be installed near the play area in Ryarsh Park. Trinity have kindly agreed to install the bench.
- Councillors would like to hold another Crime Prevention Event and the Clerk will contact the Police to make arrangements.
- It was noted that CCTV and Ring Doorbell Footage can be extremely valuable to the police after an incident. Residents are encouraged to look at any footage after an event, and contact the police with details.
- The public footpath behind Ryarsh Oast House has been widened and some rubbish, including manure, has been dumped. This will be reported to the Kent Public Rights of Way Office.
- The Parish Council's contractor has installed a new lantern to replace a damaged one on Birling Road. It was noted that this is working well. There are 4 lanterns on the traffic calming islands. If the Parish Council has enough money it will replace the other lanterns in the row so they match.
- The Parish Council has signed a contract to change electricity supplier, for a cheaper rate that was found using Utility Aid. The new supply was due to start 1st February but unfortunately there has been a delay.

Dogs

Residents are reminded that dogs are still not allowed in the enclosed Play Area. Residents and visitors are welcome to walk their dogs on the Recreation Ground now.



Kent County Council

County Councillor Hohler has kindly offered a contribution from her Members Fund toward a project in Ryarsh. The Parish Council has applied for this contribution towards the new Notice Board for Birling Road.



TMBC

Borough Councillor Banks reported:

He attended the TMBC Cabinet meeting and spoke about proposed parking charges.
He was able to raise 10 issues, but there was nothing that could be done to stop parking charges from being brought in. TMBC say they will have to cut a service if they do not charge for parking. In the end, it was agreed that West Malling will retain its one hour free on street parking. That was made as a concession. He hopes that free parking in

Martin Square will be increased from half an hour to one hour. Parking charges in the Aylesford car park were approved.

Survey responses showed that 90% of those responding were against parking charges and results of a Statutory Survey should be listened to more closely.

Cllr Banks noted that TMBC is one of only 3 Councils in the Kent that are not in debt. This is good news, but does mean that when money is distributed by Government, TMBC may not be given anything. TMBC Officers should be prudent on finances, but there is a balance.

 Cllr Mike Taylor gave the Cabinet an update on Regulation 18b Local Plan. TMBC are having real problems getting enough time to get the work done. The Regulation 18b consultation was due to be published in the Spring, but it could be pushed back to Summer or Autumn. Cllr Banks is keen that the proposals are published sooner and Cllr McKinlay agreed.

Thursday 2 May	A leisurely, flat and rural circular walk from Hadlow towards the River Medway and East Lock, going through Barnes Street and Golden Green. Good views of Hadlow Tower and two pillar boxes near the Medway. Three stiles. Mainly field paths, very little road walking, good paths and tracks. May be muddy after rain.	4.5 mile s
Thursday 9 May	Trosley Trot: a fairly flat circular walk along the bottom of the Downs with good views to the south. Moderate difficulty.	5.5 mile s
Sunday 12 May	A varied circular walk from Groombridge through the woods to Harrison's Rocks, across the Spa Valley railway (Toot! Toot!) and returning via Motts Mill. Moderate difficulty.	5.5 mile s
Thursday 16 May	West Peckham wander: pleasant circular walk past the church across the village cricket field and around back to The Swan on the Green. Moderate difficulty.	5 miles
Thursday 23 May	Darent Valley circular walk from Shoreham village. Moderate difficulty.	5 miles

National Emergency Area Retrofit - work is set to begin on the M25 and surrounding motorways in the next few weeks.

We are delivering a government commitment to add more than 150 more emergency areas to motorways across the country including several sections of the M25 and surrounding motorways.

Work to install additional emergency areas is already taking place along the M1 corridor from junction 16 up to junction 35a.

The programme of work in the south will start from 25 April 2024 and all sections are expected to be open by the end of March 2025. I am writing to give you an overview of what this means for the strategic road network.

- In the South East over the coming months work will start on:

 a M25 between junctions 5 (Sevenoaks) and 7 (Redhill), due to start from 25 April 2024.

 M25 between junctions 23 (South Mimms) and 27 (Epping), due to start from 25 April 2024.
- M3 between junctions 2 (Thorpe) and 4a (Farnborough), due to start from 29 April 2024.
 M4 between junctions 10 (Wokingham) and 12 (Theale), due to start from 7 May 2024.
 M20 between junctions 3 (West Malling) and 5 (Aylesford), due to start from 22 May 2024.
- 2024.

 M27 between junctions 4 (Southampton) and 11 (Fareham), due to start during summer

Please be aware we do our upmost to maintain these dates, however dates are subject to change, and it may take a few weeks before the roadworks appear as preparatory work is completed. We will regularly publish information about the upgrade and the roadworks on our website at https://nationalhighways.co.uk/emergency-areas.

There are major upgrades already underway at junctions 10 and 28 of the M25, as well as regular roadworks for maintenance and renewals. We know just how busy this section of the motorway network is and are working tirelessly to coordinate all this work closely and keep disruption to an absolute minimum. We are in close contact with local authorities through coordinated collaborative meetings to minimise the impact of roadworks as much as possible.

To carry out the work safely, lane one (the left lane) on the four-lane motorways listed, will be closed throughout construction. Lanes two, three and four will remain open with a 50mph speed limit in place. Existing emergency areas through roadworks will remain open and a free recovery service will be in place throughout the roadworks.



The traffic management for the working areas will be installed overnight when the traffic flows are quieter. We always do our best to minimise disruption and we apologise in advance for any inconvenience these works may cause.

The new emergency area work will mainly be carried out Mondays to Fridays from 7am to 7pm. There will be occasions when we need to close lanes, slip roads or the carriageway between junctions for construction activities and deliveries to the work sites, but this will be overnight and at weekends when traffic flows are at their lowest. Should there be a need to close overnight and at weekends when traffic flows are at their lowest. Should there be a need to close overnight there will be clearly signed diversion routes in place.

Emergency areas provide a place to stop in an emergency if drivers cannot exit the motorway or stop at a motorway service area. They are clearly signed at regular intervals along the motorway and have bright orange road surfaces to help identify them. At 100 metres long, they have plenty of space for even the largest long plus a recovery vehicle and they are equipped with emergency telephones linking directly to our control rooms to get help on the way quickly.

This investment in extra emergency areas, along with technology like stopped vehicle detection, more signs, and clear advice about all lane running motorways online and an updated Highway Code, will help road users feel safe and be safer on our roads.

Through all the work we are doing we are determined to further improve public confidence in driving on our motorways, and to continue to build and operate one of the safest and best performing road networks in the world.
